Holy Trinity Hosts Golf Clinic

The most sophisticated and successful use of television for teaching golf was demonstrated during a double assembly at Holy Trinity High School yesterday sponsored in conjunction with the Physical Education Program.

Terry Wesley, dean of the new Princeton Hills Golf Academy which will open this season in Hillsborough, brought to the show his big-screen TV teaching system which will play an integral part in the curriculum of the school. Wesley's teaching methods "on camera" were employed in his presentation of a golf clinic, along with the teaching seminars conducted by National PGA president Leo Graser and Bill Strausbaugh, the 1965 PGA "Golfer of the Year" and for many years head of the PGA's instruction program.

According to Wesley, TV has added a "great, new dimension" to golf instruction.

Several students were also able to benefit personally from a lesson on TV. In addition to the setup on the stage, which Wesley used in his presentation, similar TV devices were installed at two driving cages where free golf lessons were given. The quickie golf sessions were conducted by some of the top professional teachers in New Jersey. A pupil was able to hit a number of balls before turning to the monitor and seeing his swing on replay for correction and analysis by the pro in attendance.

Wiendl Loses In NCAA Semifinals

Joe Wiendl of Westfield was defeated in the semifinals of the NCAA wrestling tournament Friday night in Provo, Utah.

The Wilkes College senior, seeded second in the 160-pound division, lost 2-0 to Dave Martin of Iowa State. It was the first loss this year for Wiendl, who won 30 matches, including three onesided victories in this tournament. He downed Joe Norton, Big Ten Conference champion from Northwestern 9-4 to reach the semis.

The former Westfield high school champion had won three other tournaments this season, the Wilkes Christmas tourney, Mid-Atlantic Conference event and his second straight NCAA college-division championship.
